HERITAGE AREA THEMES

 **Rivers, Roads, & Rails: Transportation** traces the Metropolitan Branch of the B&O Railroad as it runs through late 1800s communities including Silver Spring and Gaithersburg. The C&O Canal Scenic Byway parallels the Potomac River, where you can hike, bike, paddle, and explore the ingenious aqueducts, locks, and culverts that were engineering marvels of their time.

 **Crossroads & Cultures: Home to Many Peoples** tells the rich histories of Montgomery County's people, the most diverse in Maryland. These include the long-standing Quaker communities of Sandy Spring and Brookeville; the many early free Black communities represented by local churches, community buildings, and cemeteries; and immigrant groups from around the globe who have enriched the area's culture.

 **The Agricultural Reserve: Farms, Markets, Conservation, and Rural Life** encompasses the 93,000 acres of protected farmland in the western part of the county—one of the most successful countryside preservation programs in the U.S. The "Ag Reserve" showcases beautiful vistas, winding country roads, historic buildings, pick-your-own farms, and farmers markets.

 **Heritage Discoveries: Unique Stories of Local History, Culture, and Nature** features the authentic sites that make Montgomery County unique, from historic houses to Civil War sites to parks, theatres, and historical societies.

EXPLORE THE HERITAGE AREA

The Montgomery County Heritage Area is rich with culture and history at every turn. Whether you are planning a farm outing for the family, a day browsing an art gallery or history museum, a road trip through the countryside, or a date night with wine and music, you will find it here.

Keep your eyes open as you journey through the Heritage Area—the scenic beauty of the rolling hills may inspire a photo stop and a chance to explore hidden gems inside our many parks. Around any bend, you may find a historic barn or a farm stand selling locally grown produce.

As you travel our Rustic Roads and Scenic Byways by car or bike, pause for a picnic along one of the county's waterways or a stay in a historic lockhouse or bed and breakfast. Be sure to visit our quaint towns and innovative restaurants, wineries, distilleries, and breweries who are keeping the farm-to-table traditions of our ancestors alive.

VISIT OUR HERITAGE SITES

Up County: West

See the early general store at the **John Poole House**, period artifacts at the **Old Bank Museum**, and live music on **Riverworks Art Center's** outdoor stage. After a stop at the **Seneca Schoolhouse Museum** on River Road, continue to the **C&O Canal National Historical Park** for a tour of **Pennyfield Lockhouse 22**.

Music and genealogy at **St. Paul Community Church and Museum** and hands-on activities at **Button Farm Living History Center** interpret African American history. Nearby is the **Izaak Walton League of America's Conservation Farm**, which joins with **McKees-Beshers Wildlife Management Area** and **Seneca Creek State Park** to provide uninterrupted wildlife habitat.

Up County: Central

Learn the story of Josiah Henson's journey from slavery to freedom at the **Josiah Henson Museum and Park** and visit **Boyds Negro School** for a look at post-emancipation education.

Discover life on a dairy farm at **King Barn Dairy MOOseum** and participate in a scavenger hunt at **Gaithersburg Community Museum**. **Historic Germantown Bank** is hosting a model train demonstration; while in town, see **Grusendorf's 1855 Log Cabin** and experience Nepali heritage and cultural at the new **Nepal Education and Cultural Center**.



VISIT OUR HERITAGE SITES

Up County: East

Tour the 1832 stone barn at Sandy Spring's **Woodlawn Museum** and walk the **Underground Railroad Trail** to **Sandy Spring Friends Meeting House**. The nearby **Sandy Spring Slave Museum** offers family activities and tours, and the **Sandy Spring Museum** will host a Sunday bluegrass jam. Don't miss **Oakley Cabin's** new virtual reality experience and then explore picturesque 1794 **Brookeville**. Hop aboard a trolley at the **National Capital Trolley Museum** and get hands-on at the **Agricultural History Farm Park**.

Rockville

Enjoy the **Latvian Museum** and stop off at nearby **Montgomery History** for a tour with Civil War Dr. Stonestreet. Take a **self-guided walking tour of African American history** with an online guide from the **Heritage Montgomery** website.

Down County

Visit Silver Spring's **B&O Railroad Station**, take a nature walk with **Nature Forward**, and ride **Glen Echo Park's** carousel. Both **Smithville's Rosenwald School** and **Harper Cabin at Brookside Nature Center** will also be open to provide a glimpse into the African American experience in Montgomery County.


